In just a couple weeks, the advent season will be here. I look forward to this time each year for lots of reasons, but there are at least two specifically Christian reasons to look forward to Advent.

"Advent" simply means "coming—especially the coming of a notable person or event." During advent, we look back to the time in history when God sent Jesus to take on humanity. We put ourselves in the place of those in the first century waiting and longing for God to keep his promise. We mark this time with special devotions and advent calendars. We sing songs with lines like "Come thou long expected Jesus" and "Joy to the world, the Lord is come" and "With angelic hosts proclaim, 'Christ is born in Bethlehem!"

We take this time to think about and marvel at the unbelievable truth that Jesus left his throne in heaven, took on the form of a servant, was born in the likeness of men, and humbled himself even to the point of dying a criminal's death on a cross (Phil. 2:5-8)! Let me encourage you to make some time during the coming busyness to reflect on these things and really think about what an incredible event this was.

But, there is a second reason for Christians to look forward to this season. During Advent, we look back to the real moment in history when God took on human flesh to fulfill the promises he had been making for thousands of years. However, there is another advent or coming that we are looking/waiting/longing for.

In John 14, Jesus promises his followers that he is going to prepare a place for them and that he will come back for them (us). We have been

preaching through the book of Revelation over the last several months, and, of course, this is one of the main themes there—Jesus will come back. When he does, he will set all things right, restore the (New) Heavens and Earth, take his seat on his throne, and establish his kingdom forever!

The advent season helps us to remember, reflect on, and celebrate Jesus' birth, but that is just the beginning (or middle) of the story. This story also has an ending. Let me encourage you to make time during this season to reflect on Jesus' future advent as well. When singing Christmas hymns and reading Christmas passages from the bible, be looking for and dwelling on this theme as well and let your heart be moved to longing for when we will see him face to face and all will be made well—when sin, evil, injustice, and death will be done away with completely and forever.
