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If you don't know, April is Volunteer Appreciation Month. Many nonprofits and organizations around the world depend on volunteer support to fully function. The church is no different - only a small percentage of those who work in our church are paid for their labor. So much of the week in and week out ministry of our church is done by those who are volunteering their time and energy. For our Easter Egg Hunt, we had around 75 volunteers; our Food Pantry runs with about 20 people working every week. The nursery ministry requires about 50 volunteers a month, and there are countless other ways our church works hard - kids and youth ministry, Sunday school, meals, VBS, music and media, security, committees, and more.

However, it is important to remember that the work that we do for our church is much more than merely volunteering. In 1 Corinthians 12, Paul compares the church to a physical body, reminding his readers that everyone who is in Christ plays an important role in the functioning of the whole - "If one member suffers, all suffer together; if one member is honored, all rejoice together" (v. 26). In his letter to the Ephesians, Paul again refers to the church as a body, telling us that those who do the work of the ministry are doing so for "building up of the body of Christ" (Eph. 4:12) and that "each part...working properly, makes the body grow so that it

builds itself up in love" (Eph. 4:16). Our labor within the church is ultimately for building up the body of Christ - expanding the reach of the gospel and strengthening and encouraging those who are in Christ to the glory of our Savior.

So thank you - for the work and many hours you put into serving our church, and ultimately serving the Lord through these various ministries.

"Therefore, my beloved brothers, be steadfast, immovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, knowing that in the Lord your labor is not in vain."

Then our kids were younger, we used to make regular trips to the Bass Pro store in Clarksville, IN. Most of our trips concluded uneventfully after we had climbed on the boats, played some games, and bought peach rings for the drive home. On one occasion, however. Cooper decided to make the trip a bit more interesting by wandering away from the family and getting lost. While the rest of us stopped in the toy section, Cooper continued to wander further and further away. It wasn't long before we realized that he was gone. Liz and I searched frantically, but when we did not immediately find him, we notified a store worker. Fortunately, he was found a couple minutes later.

I don't believe that Cooper intended to get lost when we went into the store. Liz and I had given him instructions to stay with us. He knew what he was supposed to do, but he got distracted by all the things around him, and the next thing he knew, he was lost. When I think back on it now, I am immediately thankful that he was found safe-Iv and was returned to us. I can also see it as an example of how people wander away from the truth of God's Word. Over the past several years there have unfortunately been several examples of Christian musicians, authors, and preachers who once professed faith in Christ, only to later make life choices and take positions on issues that completely contradict the

truths found in Scripture, some choosing to openly renounce their faith.

When we see these things, it is difficult for us to understand. How could someone who wrote such an awesome book, preached such amazing sermons, or sang such moving songs, now not believe what they previously wrote, preached, and sang about? While there may be a lot of different "reasons" given, the simple answer is that they are wandering away from the truth. They started out well, but due to the influence of the world and the sinfulness of the flesh, they wandered further and further away from the truth. Sometimes these people are seeking to fit in and impress others in the world. Sometimes they are seeking to fulfill sinful desires. Always, they are exchanging the truth of God for a lie and the distance from the truth causes their sinful hearts to become callused and hard.

This isn't just an issue facing high profile or famous Christians. We all know people who have professed faith in Christ and attended church faithfully for a time, only to eventually wander away. This is something that should bother us deeply. This is something that should motivate us to pray for them and to reach out to them and personally encourage them. It may be that they did not intend to wander away and that hearing from you may be the thing that helps them find their way back.
